Overview: The NFCT cross the US/Canada International Border twice, once on the Missisquoi River and once on Lake Memphremagog. As of June 1, 2009, U.S. and Canadian travelers at land-based entry points are required to present a passport or other document that denotes identity and citizenship. If you are traveling out into Canada and back to the United States on Lake Memphremagog, you may want to learn more about the [Small Vessel Reporting System](#).

Site Information: When crossing into Canada on Lake Memphremagog you are required to check in at the Canadian Customs Station in Leadville, QC. This location has a small dock with a phone (accessible from your watercraft-paddlers may need to stretch, or dock to reach it). The process involves using the phone to report your entry. There is a video camera on the Customs Building that allows agents to see you. The border is clearly marked with a buoy system which cuts across the southern point on Province Island. You can also see a clear cut line through the forest on each side of Lake Memphremagog marking the border line as well.


