We're gonna need a bigger boat.

Don't worry, as far as we know there are no massive great white sharks lurking in the waters of the Northern Forest Canoe Trail. We need a bigger boat because our NFCT community is growing.

Last year, we had more volunteers than ever show up to help with stewardship projects and events. The number of people seeking out our support to plan paddling trips on and near the canoe trail is growing exponentially. We expect more of the same in 2023.

Throughout our 20-plus year history as an organization, we've always prioritized taking care of the canoe trail. Stewardship is the heartbeat of our work. We also work hard to make sure paddlers have the best information possible to plan accordingly, whether it's a day trip on Lake Champlain or a backcountry overnight in the Allagash. But as we continue to grow and evolve, we also want to prioritize building our community. Paddling is a life-long activity, one that can be enjoyed by young adventure seekers, families with children, older adults and everyone in between — including, as you'll read about in this newsletter, rescue dogs who communicate with American Sign Language.

As paddling season approaches, we hope you'll join us for a community paddle, a race, a work weekend or a film festival. We'll gladly find a bigger boat and welcome you aboard.

We've got work to do.

Our team is getting ready. Our partners are standing by. Our plan is set. Our work truck is ... well, it's fine. Don't worry about it.

The NFCT has another ambitious stewardship season ahead, with at least seven weeks of work scheduled in New York, Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine. These Waterway Work Trips bring together our professional stewardship crew and volunteers to enhance and maintain the waterways and portages that make up our 740-mile paddling trail.

Here's what's on the docket for 2023:

June 23-25, Lake Champlain's Valcour Island Campsites, NY: Critical maintenance at a series of campsites.

June 30 to July 2, Indian Carry and Upper Saranac Lake, NY: Rehabilitate the historic "Indian Carry" portage connecting

the Raquette and Saranac Rivers in the heart of the Adirondack Park; crews will also complete stewardship work at campsites on Upper Saranac Lake.

July 7-9, Passumpsic River Community Access, VT: Install stone steps at an emerging community park near the historic Sanford covered bridge.

July 14-16, Missisquoi Paddle Pedal and Upper Missisquoi Access, VT: Develop a new access to the Missisquoi River near the Canadian border.

July 21-23, Androscoggin River, NH: Install a dock and stone steps, and clearing a new access trail.


July 28-30, Rapid River Carry, ME: Important maintenance along this historic carry.

Aug. 4-6, Moosehead Lake West Shore Campsites, ME: Create two new campsites.

The Northern Forest Canoe Trail brings together paddlers of all backgrounds and experience — including dogs.

In 2022, a deaf Australian Cattle Dog named Bunji the Blue Dog completed her 740-mile thru-paddle of the NFCT, with help from her companions Ashley Hyatt and Cole Grosner. This small but mighty pup paddled and pawed her way from Old Forge, NY, to Fort Kent, Maine, finding sticks, meeting wildlife and sleeping peacefully even as Ashley and Cole navigated rapids.

But it wasn't easy. Being deaf meant that

Ashley and Cole had to learn to communicate with Bunji using American Sign Language. And as a dog rescued from ranch land in Texas, Bunji also had to work through her fears and anxiety to learn how to sleep in tents and trust strangers.

"Over the first week of our trip, Ashley and I had quickly figured out that traveling with a dog at least our dog — closely resembled traveling with a child," Cole recalled. "We packed toys, took frequent breaks and cut back on our miles if she hadn't napped or was unusually restless or cranky."

When it came to the paddling, though, Bunji was a natural.

"She absolutely loved open water," Ashley said. "She chose a perch in the front of the boat for most of her waking hours."

Bunji's adventure is one of our favorites from 2022, but there are plenty more to check out, from a family of three finishing a section paddle years in the making to a particularly lively thru-paddler who found a way to incorporate bicycling into his trip.



PREPPING FOR PADDLING SEASON? WE CAN HELP

A prepared paddler is a happy paddler, and the team at the NFCT is here to make sure you've got all the information you need, whether you're day-tripping on the Nulhegan or planning a 740-mile thru-paddle.

The most comprehensive tool you have at your disposal is the **NFCT Trip Planner**. This interactive map let's you view dozens of trail features and trailside services, including lodging, dining, campsites, put-ins, take-outs and much more. You can load any map section and zoom in to find what you need. Please note, however, that the Trip Planner should complement your wayfinding once on the water: it is not



intended to serve as the soul source of navigational information. To learn more and try out our Trip Planner, visit northernforestcanoetrail.org/trip-planner.

Of course, we also have maps — 13 to be exact — and a variety of guidebooks, produced both by NFCT and our friends. Our waterproof maps are the most reliable tool for navigating on the water and include locations of campsites, portages, rapids and important contact info. The Official NFCT Guidebook and the Through-Paddler's Companion by Katina Daanen add useful details and interesting regional information. Finally, one of the newest tools for NFCT paddlers is the **FarOut Mobile App**. Developed in partnership with FarOut guides, this GPS-enabled guide features over 1,400 waypoints, site photos and several base maps, which work online and can be downloaded for offline use — especially handy for remote, out-of-range adventures.



The FarOut app is available for purchase as a guide for the entire 740-mile canoe trail, or for individual sections. To purchase the app, users can download the FarOut Guides app on their smartphone and search for the Northern Forest Canoe Trail, or visit bit.ly/faroutnfct. Still have questions?
