Trip Description

Traveling down the West Branch of the Penobscot River, this 26.5-mile long section is a classic Maine river trip that is great for beginners. As the river meanders through beautiful backcountry forests, there will be an exciting mix of calm stretches, quickwater, lake paddling, and welcoming campsites. This stretch of river is also known for its moose, eagles and other wildlife. Ending the trip on Chesuncook Lake provides views of Katahdin and the opportunity to visit Chesuncook Village, a small remote town that originally supported logging operations. There are no rapids or portages on this trip.

Suggested Itinerary

Chesuncook Lake is large. Winds tend to come out of the northwest, but weather and conditions can change rapidly. Be sure to stay as close to shore as possible and travel close together when making the crossing to Gero Island.


Fire permits vary by campsite.

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Camping Information

Campsites on the Penobscot River Corridor have a fee that is paid when entering through a North Maine Woods checkpoint.

Campsites are first-come, first-served but are generally abundant and well maintained. Group size, including leaders and guides, is limited to 12. Certain campsites will have two "cells" within them (as they are designed to hold two groups) so be mindful to only take up one of these cells when applicable. You can tell if a site has multiple cells because it will have the campsite name followed by a number, for example Big Ragmuff (2). Campsites that do not have a number next to them are single group campsites.
